Rationale

Homework: ***“Any work or activity which pupils are asked to do outside of lesson time, either on their own or with parents/carers”.***

1. Purposes of homework

- To improve, consolidate and reinforce essential basic skills and understanding in the core subjects of English and Maths, and other areas of the curriculum when appropriate.
- To support the development of independent work skills.
- To develop an effective link between home and school, providing parents with the opportunity to support their child's learning and development
- Throughout the year all children will be given some oral homework to develop their speaking, listening and communications skills and confidence.

2. Homework guidelines

Homework guidelines will be communicated to parents at the beginning of the academic year in "Meet the Teacher" meetings. The children will also be provided with a homework timetable where appropriate.

Nursery:

Spring term-Parent/Child Voice activity
Writing name practice

Reception:

Home reading- daily
Phonics books – weekly
Tricky/high frequency words – weekly
Family Activity- each half term
Maths Challenge cards- summer term

Year 1:

Home reading -daily
Phonics/spelling- weekly
Maths- weekly (from spring second half term)

Year 2:

Home reading- daily
Spellings and vocabulary work- weekly
Maths-weekly (including Times Tables)
Half term holiday optional topic related homework

Year 3:

Home reading-daily
Spellings and vocabulary work – weekly
Maths – weekly (including Times Tables)
Topic/research-fortnightly

Year 4:

Home reading- daily
Spellings and vocabulary work – weekly
Maths – weekly (including Times Tables)
Topic-fortnightly

Year 5:

Home reading- daily

Spellings – weekly
Maths – weekly (including Times Tables)
Literacy Skills-weekly

Year 6:

Home reading –daily
Spellings-weekly
Maths – weekly (including Times Tables)
Literacy Skills-weekly
Science-fortnightly

SLCN ARP

Each child has a communication wallet to encourage opportunities to talk about weekend and holiday news at school and for children to talk to their parents about school activities.

Speech and Language therapist sets home learning activities individually for each child.

Homework is set weekly to meet individual targets and to reinforce school learning.

Each child is encouraged to read and share books with their family at least four/five times a week.

3. A special word about Reading

Reading should be considered as a daily activity for all children. For younger pupils this will be 'sharing' a book with your child that is, talking about a book, reading to them and hearing them read for a short time. It is important for all children to read aloud and develop expression and intonation. Older children should be given the time and the space to read independently for enjoyment and they may still wish for you to read to them.

4. Time

It is difficult to judge how much time should be spent on homework; each child will have different needs and parents should use their discretion. Whilst reading should happen almost daily, other tasks could be completed in short, sharp bursts, such as practising number facts/timetables or spellings.

Clearly, learning at home is not just about work sent home from school. It is essential that there is time for family activities, hobbies and interests which support learning. The habit of homework should start in the early years with enjoyable activities which parents and carers can carry out together with the child.

5. Role of Parents

Parents are requested to support their children and the school with homework in the following ways:

- provide a reasonably peaceful, suitable place for doing homework
- make the value of homework clear to children
- check and sign the homework diary each weekend to make sure work is completed on time

Parents will be informed should their child fail to complete their homework and where necessary relevant action will be taken in school by the class teacher or Phase leader. A weekly homework club is available to all children to support them with their homework.

Parents, teachers and pupils should appreciate that the homework policy is flexible and there will be occasions when it is not appropriate for homework to be set.
