




<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The United Kingdom has a monarch (queen or king) • Our current monarch is Queen Elizabeth II • Things and people from a long time ago are still remembered • Plays are written to be performed on a stage • Overtime some things remain • Some people are remembered long after they have died 	 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • She was born at Greenwich. • Her parents were King Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn. <div data-bbox="367 573 898 1279"> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Elizabeth was 25 when she became queen. • She did not marry and had no children. • She spoke four languages fluently; English, French, Italian and Latin. • She was the last Tudor monarch. • Her navy defeated the Spanish Armada in 1588. • She loved to watch plays, especially those of Shakespeare. • She loved dancing and music. • She wore thick white face makeup to hide scars from when she had small pox. • She had red hair like her father. • During Elizabeth I's reign lots of English explorers searched for new lands and treasures. • She was 69 when she died in 1603. </div>	 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • He was born at Stratford-upon-Avon • His parents were John and Mary Shakespeare <div data-bbox="961 573 1493 1287"> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Shakespeare was married to Anne. They had three children: Suzanne, Judith and Hamnet. • He wrote 37 plays and 150 poems. • He was an actor in a theatre group called the Lord Chamberlain's Men. • His plays were either comedies, tragedies or histories. • He built his own theatre, called the Globe on the banks of the River Thames. • One of his first plays was Henry V. • Some of the phrases Shakespeare wrote we still use today: <i>Vanish into thin air...</i> <i>Green-eyed monster...</i> <i>A heart of gold...</i> • He died on his birthday, 23rd April 1616 aged 51. </div>	 <div data-bbox="1749 329 2068 532"> <p>She was born in Mayfair, London Her parents were King George VI and Queen Elizabeth</p> </div> <div data-bbox="1533 573 2064 1287"> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Elizabeth was 25 when she became queen. • She was married to Prince Philip, who died in 2021. They had four children: Charles, Anne, Andrew, and Edward. • She is the United Kingdom's longest reigning monarch, having reigned for 70 years. • She has two birthdays each year, but only gets one year older! She has an official birthday in June and her actual birthday in April. • She loves horses and her corgi dogs. • She has had 14 prime ministers. • Elizabeth II never went to school! Instead, she was homeschooled. • She speaks both English and French. </div>

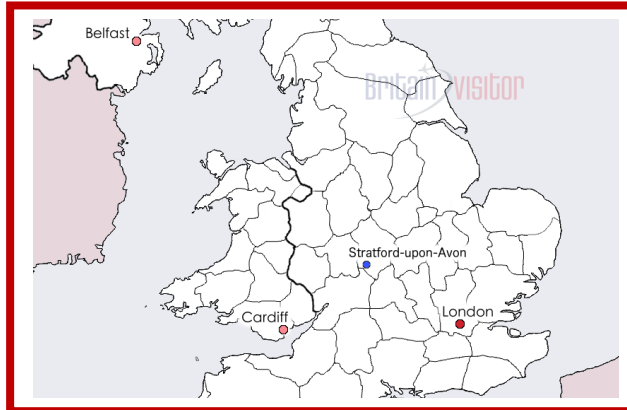
